# Indigenous Intangible Cultural Heritage in Museums in Canada and USA



The seminar presenter is 2005 Churchill Fellow Lori Richardson. Lori is an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander woman from North Queensland (Kuku Yelangi/Meriam Mir). She is currently the Assistant Director, Reconciliation and Repatriation Section, in the Office of Indigenous Policy Coordination.



Lori's fellowship focused on Native American and Canadian Aboriginal approaches to collecting, exhibiting and preserving Indigenous intangible cultural heritage.

The seminar will focus on the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of the American Indian, Washington DC and the Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump Interpretative Centre, Alberta, Canada.

In particular, Lori will focus on the ways in which these institutions engaged with Indigenous peoples throughout the building and exhibition development.

The symposium will explore the significance of ethnographic collections made during Captain James Cook's 18th Century voyages in the Pacific. Many of these remarkable objects will be on display at the Museum in an exhibition from late June to September this year. These objects from the University of Göttingen's Cook-Forster collection provide insights into the worlds of both European and Pacific peoples during the second-half of the eighteenth century. The history of the collections themselves since the late 18th Century, their importance to the descendants of their makers as well as to anthropology, art and museology will also be explored.


